

- Transfer to Salisbury Plain, Bulford. Ambulance Driver attached to F.A.N.Y.s. We
 were expecting an invasion and our job was to empty the hospitals close to the
 coast, the invasion never came and I was transferred to D.C.R.E. Stretford,
 Manchester. The Americans and Canadians had arrived, so the engineers were
 busy putting up feeding stations, I drove them around.
- During training in Scotland going in a gas chamber being exposed to DM Nose gas – we had to identify – scary.
